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## introduction

Velcome to the first issue in a two year series comprising eight issues of Spill the Beans through which we are embarking on a journey through the texts written by Saint Luke: both his Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles.

#### **Lukan Lectionary**

While working through our previous Word and World Lectionary cycle the Spill the Beans Resource Team was already working on the next steps and had long discussed the possibility of focussing for a year on one Gospel. There was not, amongst us, a great desire at this stage to return to one of the other lectionaries like the RCL or Narrative, so we started initially to work on a way to cover all of the text of Luke's Gospel.

As we completed that work it seemed natural to continue on with Luke's second book as these are two parts of one larger work. While seeking to include every verse of each book during the year we did need to do some work in order to also meaningfully mark the main seasons, so we have split how we approach the text into sections. This is particularly noticeable, of course, when journeying through the Gospel as we take a season to travel the Road to Golgotha before then taking a long season on the Ministry of Jesus. We hope that this makes some logical sense.

We keep the format for the layout of the issues as we have used in past years, which we hope encourages the development of intergenerational worship.

#### **Intergenerational Worship**

Spill the Beans has always been rooted in the power of story telling. Story binds generations together. In that shared bond of story lies the creative space for building relationships between generations. Using different ways to engage with the story recognises the variety amongst us all: some learn by listening, others by doing, others by creating. All are valuable and a part of our shared worship of God.

We are encouraging you to experiment as we will be doing with ways to worship intergenerationally in an authentic and inclusive manner. To that end we are still providing a rich variety of resources but grouped by how they help us 'tell the story', 'explore the story', and 'live the story'. Mix and match, rewrite, contextualise for your own setting, try something different, and have fun with it! Please do give us feedback.

There are many resources online to help think more deeply about intergenerational worship. A simple but very helpful summary is provided by the Methodist Church, copied below.

#### Intergenerational worship IS about:

- building relationships—offering a key time for people to get to know each other better and build a sense of connection;
- a time of worship and learning that is offered in a simplified and participatory way—simple does not mean shallow; rather it enables everyone to contribute and receive in a meaningful and appropriate way;
- providing an inclusive experience and a sense of belonging —helping everyone of all abilities to feel part of the body of Christ, whatever their experience;
- being a bridge—not only between ages but also for those who are exploring what being part of a church means. This relaxed service style can provide a comfortable place for some to discover more about Christianity;
- encouragement, nurture and inclusiveness—it is a means by which faith can grow and, in turn, inform life-making or life-changing decisions;
- **exploring vocation**—an opportunity to discover and develop gifts and calling.

#### Intergenerational worship is NOT about:

- limiting the richness of resources used;
- oversimplifying the message or adding a children's talk into the 'usual' service;
- · unstructured and chaotic worship;
- children having token responsibilities for roles and participation;
- limiting potential to explore faith and discipleship together;
- nuclear families exclusively worshipping together.

#### **Journeying With The Doctor**

Pelcome to our new lectionary based around the texts of Saint Luke's Gospel and Acts of the Apostles.

It is not possible just to work our way through the gospel chronologically, as there are inevitably some diversions at different points in the year to align with the liturgical calendar. So we have tried to approach this a little differently with some major themes that we will explore: the beginning birth narrative, the road to Golgotha, Holy Week and the Passion, and finally Jesus' life and ministry. We are going to be reading every verse of the gospel during the year.

For the Acts of the Apostles, Luke's sequel, we have tried to follow chronologically the events as Luke records them

as much as possible. Again, we will be reading every verse of Acts over the course of the year.

#### Introduction

Te embark this Advent on a two-year journey through the writings of Luke, beginning in his Gospel for 2025-26 and then moving in our second year to the Acts of the Apostles. It is a journey we are looking forward to as we work through these two books and get closer to both the author and his subject matter: Jesus, his followers, and the early church.

The Gospel of Luke is very attractive. While it does not have the same breathless style as the Gospel of Mark, the writing engages the reader in the story of Jesus and his ground-breaking and transformative message. When we put aside our familiarity with many of the passages we can still be left shocked and surprised at the turn of events Luke describes. Parables delight with their twists and turns, inviting us into the world of Jesus and his listeners and opening our eyes to fresh understanding of the kingdom of God.

It has long been the opinion of scholars that Luke based his writing on the Gospel of Mark but with additional sources, oral and written (including the posited 'O' of which the author of Matthew's Gospel clearly also had access), giving information that allowed him to expand upon the content of Mark's Gospel. While there can be a modernity to Luke's gospel, for instance in his concern for having good sources of information (trying to avoid accusations of misinformation?), we also recognise that inevitably the author of the Gospel will have their own emphasis and prioritisation, their own lens through which they share Jesus' story.

This comes through in some of the themes that are developed throughout the gospel. Luke can be accused

on occasions of some radical tendencies, clearly trying to emphasise Jesus' role in challenging power and in questioning and breaking down the boundaries within society. Overall this work explores the presence of God's grace through the life of Jesus, his actions and ministry, his teaching and healing, his death and resurrection, which works to draw us into the life of God.

Who was the author? We do not really know. There are some traditions regarding who Luke might have been. The most common is that Luke was a physician who accompanied Paul and worked with him in the early decades of the church. Some go further, identifying Luke as a Syrian who came from Antioch. There are some interesting observations we can make about Luke from his texts themselves. For instance, while it is clear that Luke knew a lot about the Jewish beliefs and practices, one sometimes gets the impression that this is abstract knowledge rather than lived-experience: he has done his research, but perhaps did not have first-hand experience of the rituals that are integral to much of Jesus' ministry and his reversals of the status quo. This points to the likelihood that Luke would have been a Gentile, giving his Gospel a unique perspective in comparison to those of Matthew, Mark and John.

We see that Luke often sets scenes in what feels like a urban environment, perhaps signifying Luke's own experience, rather than the more rural setting that was more likely that which Jesus actually experiences in his itinerant ministry around the countryside of Palestine.

You may know that Saint Luke is the patron saint of painters. There is a story that Luke had first painted



the Madonna and Child being in their presence when Jesus was young. It is a lovely story, but alas there is no evidence to support it.

If we turn to Luke's second book, the Acts of the Apostles, which spends a great deal of time with Paul's missionary ministry, if Luke had been a fellow traveler with Paul it seems very strange that he would not mention the letters that Paul wrote to churches, and yet there is no mention of them. Neither does Luke in Acts explore the theology of Paul that is developed so clearly in his letters, which seems very odd if he had spent time directly with Paul. However, he clearly knew well Paul's mission.

Neither can we be sure of a date or location for the composition of this Gospel. Tradition suggests either Antioch or Rome, which is the location where the Acts of the Apostles culminates. It must have been after Mark's Gospel was complete, so perhaps around 85 CE is a good suggestion, but there is a healthy error margin to be applied here!

What we know is that the Gospel of Luke has had a profound impact in shaping the world we know. There are phrases we will visit during the year that are part of our common language, and Luke's account has a crucial part in helping us understand Jesus and his transformative and graceful work.

#### A Statement of Intent

Le start right at the beginning of the Gospel for the first Sunday in Advent with the opening four verses which in the original Greek (and many English translations) is one long sentence: a formal statement of intent, a prologue that follows the same pattern common for historical writings of the time.

Luke is taking authority and responsibility here for the account which he is presenting. He notes the study he has done, the research and gathering of sources, in order to create order out of the many stories that would have been circulating about Jesus of Nazareth.

The Gospel is addressed to a particular person, Theophilus. The name means "a friend/lover of God". Who this might be is the basis of conjecture. It could be a person of high social standing, one wonders at the possibility of it being a patron who commissioned Luke to take on this work, and whose wealth and status might then have allowed the work to be copied and distributed. On the other hand, this could also be a literary device that Luke adopts. Anyone who comes to the text afresh, open to be a friend of God are thus invited in to the Gospel by the good Dr Luke himself.

The formality of this opening statement is somewhat at odds with the approachability of the rest of the Gospel, but perhaps we see in that formality an expression of the importance of what is to follow in Luke's mind.

The short passage from Joshua is a farewell message marking a transition and change as he blesses the Transjordanian tribes on their journey to their homes. He instructs them to observe the commandments and instructions that had been handed down from Moses: "to love the Lord your God, to walk in all his ways, to keep his commandments, and to hold fast to him, and to serve him with all your heart and with all your soul." (Joshua 22:5) These are words that may echo in our own minds as we embark on our own journey through the Gospel of Luke, in order that we might love the Lord our God and walk in God's ways as Jesus did.

And so we begin...

#### **Story Retelling**

#### **Mitchell's Family History**

I sat down in the sanctuary seeking peace and quiet. Life in church is not easy at this moment in time. We did not have enough money to pay for repairs to the roof. Nor did we have the volunteers needed to run the next coffee morning. And there were people in hospital needing visited, school assemblies to lead, and committee meetings to attend all over the country, Spill the Beans scripts to write... my 'to do' list just getting longer by the minute.

So, I sought refuge in church appreciating the silence as I waited on God. I was longing for inspiration, hope and guidance, so I prayed with all my heart, mind and soul!

I had only been there for a few minutes when I was hit by a little bit of paper! I had no idea where it came from and I thought it had maybe fallen from the balcony. I picked it up and put it in my pocket and settled down to pray again.

Then another bit of paper hit me and I thought someone was hiding in church, trying to distract me, so, I shouted out: "Who's there?"

There was silence for a moment and then I heard the pitter patter of paws running down the aisle. It was Mitchell puffing and wheezing as he climbed the chancel steps where he flopped on the floor exhausted.

"Mitchell, was that you who was throwing paper at me?"

"Oh, yes, sorry about that," he answered. "I was trying to write a history of my family and I kept making mistakes! I was frustrated at having to start all over again and I was finding it really difficult as to whose story I should write about first and what were the best stories that would tell other people about my family and the lives we had lived in various places around the world."

"I can understand your difficulties, Mitchell," I sighed.

"Oh Meenister, have you written a history of your family?" he asked excitedly. "Maybe I could read it and that would maybe help me to write a true version of the Mouse family line."

"No, Mitchell," I said, "I am afraid I have never written our family history. I think there are things in my family that are best not told, if you know what I mean?"

Mitchell clapped his paws together, "Oh Meenister, that sounds intriguing. Is there real scandal in your family line?"

"Well, Mitchell," I replied, "I am sure there is scandal in all families and stories that are difficult to tell."

Mitchell squinted his eyes, "Meenister, I think you are trying to avoid my question!"

I stared for a moment at Mitchell then said: "You are absolutely right, Mitchell! I am totally avoiding your

question because... well, just because this is not the time or the place to recall the disasters that beset my family."

Mitchell rolled his eyes, "Och, c'mon Meenister, I am sure everyone would want to know."

"Well, they will just have to wait, Mitchell, for some things are best left unsaid..." I paused a moment then asked: "Mitchell, what makes you want to write a family history?"

"Well, I was reading my bible and I discovered that Luke decided to write an eyewitness account of the life of Jesus. Luke found it really hard as well to decide what to put in and what to keep out."

"Aye, Mitchell," I said, "I've always thought that Luke was writing it because his friend Theophilus was asking so many questions. Luke wanted to put in writing all the things he and others had seen and heard during Jesus' time on earth."

"Who was this Theophilus bloke?" Mitchell asked.

"Well, we are not quite sure who he was," I replied. "He might have been someone of importance because Luke calls him 'most honourable'. He may well have been a wealthy man who was supporting the work of Jesus and had maybe requested that someone should write these stories of Jesus so that others would read them and learn from them.

"Maybe he was a man of faith," I went on, "who began following Jesus and he wanted something to read and learn from! The name Theophilus means 'lover of God' or 'friend of God.' Maybe he hoped that in future other friends of God would have an accurate account of the words and teachings of Jesus."

"Well, Meenister," Mitchell said thankfully, "I am glad Theophilus was an inspiration to Luke as his gospel, along with the other gospel writers and Paul's letter to the churches and the stories from the Old Testament about the life of God's people has given us the bible today so that we can have an accurate account of what God wanted from his people."

I smiled, "Yes, Mitchell, it took many thousands of years of storytelling which was then condensed into one large collection so that the people of God have a record of God's story in which we can unpack the truth of God now as these same words did when Luke first wrote his gospel all those years ago."

"Well, Meenister, maybe this book about God is far more important than my family or your family's history."

I chuckled, "I think it most certainly is, Mitchell, and we should thank those who wrote it down and who gathered all those eyewitness accounts so that the truth of God was made known."

"Amen to that, Meenister," said Mitchell.

#### **Discussion Starters**

Invite everyone to think about favourite or most memorable openings. These could be the first line from a novel or an opening scene of a film.

Examples could be:

"Once there were four children whose names were Peter, Susan, Edmund, and Lucy." (The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, CS Lewis)

"It was a bright cold day in April, and the clocks were striking thirteen." (Nineteen Eight-Four, George Orwell)

"It is a truth universally acknowledged, that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife." (Pride and Prejudice, Jane Austen)

"All this happened, more or less." (Slaughterhouse-Five, Kurt Vonnegut)

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair." (A Tale of Two Cities, Charles Dickens)

Or in film the opening scenes to Jaws, Raiders of the Lost Ark, 2001: A Space Odyssey, Citizen Kane, most James Bond films, Trainspotting, Star Wars: A New Hope, The Matrix, are just a few with iconic scenes to start off the story.

- What is your most memorable opening?
- Why is it memorable?
- What difference does a memorable start make to a book/film?

Luke takes a rather different approach with the opening to his Gospel. Together read Luke 1:1-4. Then read the opening verses of the other gospels for a contrast: Mark 1:1-3, Matthew 1:1-2f, John 1:1-5. Mark launches into prophetic expectation, Matthew heads into a genealogy for Jesus, while John goes fully theological.

- How do you respond to each of these different openings?
- What is different about the approach Luke takes?
- Which one captures you most effectively and why does it have that effect?

Theophilus is addressed by Luke in the prologue. We do not know who he is, but it is no accident that the name means "friend/lover of God". This could be a patron for Luke, commissioning his authorship of the Gospel, or it might be a literary device of Luke's drawing all lovers of God into this text that is personally addressed to us.

Work together as a group to imagine you are collectively writing your own account of Jesus, through your own experience of knowing Jesus. Write your own prologue. If you have a number of groups working, then share their prologues with each other when they are completed.

- What is the essence that was captured in the prologue(s)?
- How much could you tell about the story to follow from the prologue(s)?
- What might be a 'prologue' for yourself at the start of each day?





#### **Engaging The Text**

You will need: A4 sheets of paper, pens, large old Bible, sheet of paper on which the Gospel reading (Luke 1:1-4) is printed.

In the centre of the worship space place the old Bible, open at Luke and lay on top the sheet with the passage printed on it.

Explain that this year we are exploring the books of Luke and Acts, both written by the same person. It is a journey into what Luke thought was important to tell his community about Jesus.

Have someone come to the Bible pick up the sheet with the passage written on it and read it aloud, then place it back down.

Ask everyone to pause and reflect on these words: What has Luke chosen to tell us about Jesus.

As we begin this journey what will you be looking for?

Invite everyone to write a question at the top of each page in their booklet; things they will look out for over the year. Such questions might be:

- · What words are important?
- · What images will I take with me?
- · What themes does Luke focus on?
- · What stories are new?
- What lessons do I need to learn?

Invite everyone to write a different question at the top of each page and to fill in the booklet as the year goes on.

#### **Advent Book**

You will need: basic jotters, purple paper or gift wrap, star stickers, scissors, pencils, sticky tape, gold/silver pens.

Give each participant a jotter and ask them to cover it with purple paper. They should cut a piece of purple paper about 3 cm bigger all around than the size of the jotter with the cover open, lay the jotter on the wrong side of the coloured paper and then fold in edges to fit snugly around jotter and then to secure the edges with tape, just as you would cover jotters and books when you were at school (if you are of a certain age)! Ask the participants to decorate the jotter with sparkly star stickers and to write their name on the front of their jotter's, using silver/gold pens. They should also add the title of their Advent book, such as: Advent Journal, Advent Reflections, Advent Art.

Talk about the introduction to Luke's gospel and the beginning of telling a story. Encourage participants to use their Advent book as a way of helping them to reflect on the journey through Advent.

#### A Blank Page

You will need: small blank canvases, poster paints in purple, blue, silver, gold, sparkly stars, paint brushes, plates to put paint on, tubs for water, aprons and covers for tables.

Protect the tables or work surfaces with covers and give participants an apron or something similar to wear, to avoid anyone getting messy! Put a small amount of each colour of paint onto the paper plates, to allow each participant to have their own 'paint palette'. Give each participant a canvas, paint brush and paint palette and ask them to paint onto their blank canvas in the colours of Advent: swirls, trails or whatever people's imaginations take them. Stars can be added whilst the paint is wet, (hopefully they will stick). Of if you prefer the stars can be added later using glue sticks.

Talk about starting at the beginning with a blank sheet, the possibilities and challenges this gives. Talk about Luke starting at the beginning with a blank page as he seeks to tell the story of Jesus. Talk about Advent as the beginning of the Christian year. How are we going to tell Jesus' story today?

#### **Advent Candles 1**

You will need: printed paper, Advent candles, felt tip pens, scissors and glue sticks, template available from Sun Hats and Wellie Boots here: https://www.sunhatsandwellieboots.com/2021/11/paper-advent-candle-to-make-colour.html.

Print off the free printable
Paper Advent Candle to
make and colour. Follow
the instructions given. This
is an easy craft to do and
makes a lovely paper candle
for people to take home
and include in their Advent
displays.

Talk about the season of Advent and the ways we use candles and calendars to help us mark the days until Christmas. Encourage



participants to think about how they can wait with hope and patience and use the time for both action and reflection. For children, encourage them to place their candle beside their Advent calendar and to be still for a moment each day to thank God for something.

#### **Advent Candles 2**

You will need: paper plates, thick card, scissors, sticky tape, felt tip pens, a hole punch, narrow ribbon, scraps of paper (green and purple), PVA glue and glue spreaders.

Cut the centre section out of a paper plate to form a ring, it may be useful to have this prepared beforehand. Give each participant a paper plate ring and ask them to lay it on their work surface as though the centre of the plate is still in place. Ask participants to stick scraps of green paper onto the ring using the PVA glue. The pieces of paper should overlap. They should then cut out a candle shape that fits into the centre section of the ring. Once this has been done, they should stick scraps of purple paper onto the candle and to colour in the flame using the felt tip pens. Once this has been completed, they should then punch a hole in the ring above the candle—this is best done when the glue is dry—and to thread ribbon through the hole so that the candle wreath can be hung up.

Talk about the season of Advent and the ways we use candles and calendars to help us mark the days until Christmas. Encourage participants to think about how they can wait with hope and patience and use the time for both action and reflection. For children, encourage the children to place their candle beside their Advent calendar and to be still for a moment each day to thank God for something.

#### **Friends Of God Tag**

You will need: space to move around.

Ask those participating to gather in the middle of your space and to choose one or two people to be the 'IT'. Ask everyone to move around and when 'IT' tags you to then join hands with them to form a chain. Continue to play the game until everyone is linked together in a chain.

The name Theophilus means 'friend of God', talk about how as the story of Jesus is told, from news of his coming and birth and on through his life, more people join in and become friends of God. Talk about how we tell the story today.

#### Witnesses

You will need: a short video (a YouTube short, for instance, perhaps a Pixar short movie?) and the means to show it or a few people who have rehearsed a short drama and space for them to perform, paper, pencils, 5-6 prepared questions relating to the video or the drama.

Show the video or perform the prepared drama, asking people to watch carefully. Ask the questions you have prepared and get participants to write down their answers. Then compare the answers they have given.

Talk about being a witness to an event and how people notice different things. Use this as a way into a discussion about the gospel stories and in particular how Luke started to write his version of the gospel. Talk about how we tell the story of the gospel today.

#### **Theophilus**

You will need: sheets of paper with the name 'Theophilus' written across the top and pens.

This can either be done as an individual activity with each person being given an A4 sheet and a pen, and then ask them to write as many words as they can with three or more letters, using the letters from 'Theophilus', once they have completed this, they can then compare their lists to the others people have come up with. This can also be done as a group activity with a large flip chart sized sheet of paper, people work together to give suggestions of words that are three letters or more, made from the letters of the name 'Theophilus'.

Talk about Luke beginning to write his gospel and the things he would have heard. Talk about how we tell the story of the gospel today.



#### **Call To Worship**

A blank page not yet written upon. A new start, a second chance, the advent of the story uet untold.

Might we hear it as if for the first time. And hear what we have so far unheard.

Let us gather in this moment, of the story of God becoming flesh.
