

introduction

Pelcome to the third in a series of eight issues of Spill the Beans through which we are taking an alternative journey through the Scripture over a two year period. Having spent the previous year with The Women's Lectionary, and not at the beginning point of either the Revised Common Lectionary or the Narrative Lectionary, this has been an opportunity for thinking about a different way to engage the Scripture with a contemporary setting.

Word And World Lectionary

Members of the Spill the Beans Resource Team took time out to consider the way forward and with enthusiasm embarked on creating our own two year lectionary. We had past experience with our "Path Less Travelled" lectionary in 2018-19 which was inspired by user feedback.

This time we decided to deliberately and methodically to engage Word and World using the device of special days and themes. For instance, using United Nations' focus days, or saints days, or particular festivals. We have shaped these into short thematic series. We would encourage engagement both with the Scriptural texts for each day and to use this as an opportunity for your congregation to engage with some of the international themes that arise.

This is a different approach for us and we hope it will be inspiring to you in your worship as we pray it will be for us as we lead worship in our own settings.

We have decided to keep the format for the layout of the issues as we have used in the past year, and to encourage the development of intergenerational worship.

Intergenerational Worship

Spill the Beans has always been rooted in the power of story telling. Story binds generations together. In that shared bond of story lies the creative space for building relationships between generations. Using different ways to engage with the story recognises the variety amongst us all: some learn by listening, others by doing, others by creating. All are valuable and a part of our shared worship of God.

We are encouraging you to experiment as we will be doing with ways to worship intergenerationally in an authentic and inclusive manner. To that end we are still providing a rich variety of resources but grouped by how they help us 'tell the story', 'explore the story', and 'live the story'. Mix and match, rewrite, contextualise for your own setting, try something different, and have fun with it! Please do give us feedback.

There are many resources online to help think more deeply about intergenerational worship. A simple but very helpful summary is provided by the Methodist Church, copied below.

Intergenerational worship IS about:

- building relationships—offering a key time for people to get to know each other better and build a sense of connection;
- a time of worship and learning that is offered in a simplified and participatory way—simple does not mean shallow; rather it enables everyone to contribute and receive in a meaningful and appropriate way;
- providing an inclusive experience and a sense of belonging —helping everyone of all abilities to feel part of the body of Christ, whatever their experience;
- being a bridge—not only between ages but also for those who are exploring what being part of a church means. This relaxed service style can provide a comfortable place for some to discover more about Christianity;
- encouragement, nurture and inclusiveness—it is a means by which faith can grow and, in turn, inform life-making or life-changing decisions;
- **exploring vocation**—an opportunity to discover and develop gifts and calling.

Intergenerational worship is NOT about:

- · limiting the richness of resources used;
- oversimplifying the message or adding a children's talk into the 'usual' service;
- unstructured and chaotic worship;
 - children having token responsibilities for roles and participation;
 - limiting potential to explore faith and discipleship together;
 - nuclear families exclusively worshipping together.

embers of the Spill the Beans Resource Team have been exploring ideas on what to do following our year with The Women's Lectionary. As we are mid-stream in both Revised Common Lectionary and Narrative Lectionary, we decided to take the opportunity to do something different.

This is our second foray into creating our own lectionary following The Path Less Travelled in 2018/19. The inspiration for this new plan was to connect the worship of the church more systematically with events that are happening around and outside the church. This includes 'national' or 'world' days, particular seasonal events and people. We are excited at the opportunity this may give us to engage with other events. Some are very serious such as International Holocaust Memorial Day, while others may inspire some fun such as National Ice Cream Day and one close to our hearts... Jelly Bean Day!

or Church of Scotland readers, this is the Sunday after the General Assembly, during which there will undoubtedly have been reminders of our call to mission. Commissioners will have been exhorted to do more, to try harder to "share the good news" and reverse the seemingly inexorable decline of the church. Our secondary text, from Matthew 28, may well have been quoted in this regard, despite the very different context in which the 'great commission' was issued by the risen Jesus to his disciples.

Moses, like the eleven disciples, had a genuine calling from God and vitally important work to do, but one or two points are worth noting before rushing to superimpose his story on to our own:

- The call came from God—however the divine voice was heard—and not from his fellow-Israelites, who would not even have recognised him as one of themselves.
- 2. Moses' calling, like that of the apostles, came when the time was right, and not before. Moses had to be ready, even if he did not think he was.
- 3. God's commission came as a complete surprise to him. He was terrified and utterly daunted by what God seemed to be expecting of him, and this is true of many of the Biblical 'call' narratives (cf. Isaiah 6:1-8; Jeremiah 1:4-10; Jonah 1:1-3).

Real discernment is needed if we find ourselves in a similar situation. Do I feel daunted because this task is not the right one for me, or because, deep down, I know it is? If the former, then saying 'no' is the right answer,

however clamourous the voices telling us otherwise. If the latter, then we need to trust that God, with the task, will give us the strength to complete it.

Moses had blood on his hands (Exodus 2:11-12); he had



been brought up in the Egyptian court away from his mother's people (Exodus 2:5-10; Acts 7:20-22); his self-esteem was low (3:11) and he was full of doubts and questions. He needed assurance about who he was and who God was before he could think about approaching Pharaoh on the people's behalf.

His first question (v. 11) is about himself and his own inadequacy. His second (v. 13) is about the identity of the one who is putting this massive responsibility on his shoulders, expecting him to risk everything for the sake of people whom he hardly knows. The answer he gets is enigmatic to say the least. "I am who I am" replies the one who has many names and none.

Unsatisfactory as this answer may have been for Moses, it opens up the potential for rich inter-faith dialogue. Although for Moses the nameless one is the God of his ancestors, "of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob", there is space for "I am" to be encountered differently in the stories of other nations and peoples. It may also resonate with people who do not want or are unable to be pinned down to one pronoun, description or gender. When asked, "Are you male or female, gay or straight, Christian or agnostic?" their answer could legitimately be, "I am who I am—like the one who made me."

God—to use the convenient shorthand—is able to use Moses with all his doubts and uncertainties, and there is hope in that for all of us. We do not need to be completely sorted before we go out and serve. Moses, who feels himself to be nothing (v. 11) becomes 'somebody' through God's interaction with him. Reassurance comes not from a reminder of his own abilities, but from the fact that "I am" will be with him. This is exactly the same promise given by the risen Jesus to his fearful disciples. Not "You can do it" or "Everything will be fine" but "I will be with you—no matter what".

Story Retelling

Ducking The Questions

Moses and God run through things again.

Moses: Who do I think I am?

That'll be the first thing I get asked.

Who do I think I am?

God: And who do you think you are?

Moses: Well, I'm nobody special, am I?
God: I'm not looking for a superstar.

Moses: What are you looking for?

God: Nobody special.

Moses: Haha! OK. But I mean, I'm just me.

God: Perfect.

Moses: Look, you can't just show up and ask some

little guy to do some huge thing, just like that.

God: Abraham was OK with it.

Moses: Abraham was a hero! He's famous. A real man

of faith.

God: He didn't feel like that when we first spoke. I'd

guess he felt like... nobody special.

Moses: I'll never have his faith, or his fame.

God: Let's wait and see.

Moses: Who are you anyway?

God: I'm just me.

Moses: That's my line!

God: I borrow from the best.

Moses: Can't you say a bit more about yourself?

People are going to ask.

God: You're going to go to them then? And to

Pharoah? Excellent!

Moses: I didn't say that. Stop ducking the question.

Who are you?

God: I'm Abraham's God. And Isaac's God. And

Jacob's God.

Moses: (after a silence) Do you really think I can do

this?

God: Do you really think you can do this?

Moses: You know I don't.

God: I'll be with you.

Moses: Our ancestors' God, of no name and no

answers, who asks big things of little people?

God: That's me. I'll be with you.

Discussion Starters

Both of this week's passages entail a commissioning for a task. In groups talk about different tasks that people have been involved in, which could be within a church context, within the community, or perhaps in a work environment.

- What was the task and what were the challenges that the task brought?
- Who was involved in choosing who would manage that task?
- What was your part in that task and how did you feel about being asked to be involved?

Another aspect of both of these passages is that the commissioning to a new task also comes with some doubting and questioning. And it is not all easily resolved, rather the tasks begins with those doubts and questions still hanging in the air, perhaps to be overcome in the very action and doing that God and Jesus commission.

- What doubts or questions have you encountered when meeting a difficult new challenge?
- How did you change in the process of working through that challenge?
- What was good about that process, and what had negative consequences for you?

There is a powerful contrast between verses 11 and 14 in Exodus 3. Verse 11 has Moses declares "Who am I that I should..." It is as though he is saying in response to God's request: I am nothing, what can I bring, give up on me. Which we contrast with God's powerful statement in v. 14 "I am who I am."

One of the singer Gloria Gaynor's well known anthemic songs is "I am what I am" written by Jerry Herman, originally from the Broadway musical *La Cage aux Folles*. It is a song of empowerment, and, of course, taken up as a song of defiance in the LGBT community against all who would try to say "you are nothing".

It's my world that I want to have a little pride in My world and it's not a place I have to hide in Life's not worth a damn 'Til you can say, I am what I am

The song fades to the singer crying out:

Oh, I am I am, I am, I am good I am, I am, I am strong I am, I am, I am worthy I am, I am, I belong, oh I am, I am

Oh, oh, I am
I am, I am, I am useful
I am, I am, I am true
I am, I am, I am somebody
I am as good as new, uh huh
Oh, yes I am
I am

- Who are you?
- How does knowing that God has a commission for you affect how you understand yourself?
- How do you experience a sense of belonging and worth in your church or community?
- What can we do to bring a greater sense of belonging and dignity to all?





Engaging The Text

You will need: A6 size cards (with "I Am" printed on one side, in different colours and font styles), central table, facility to play some music.

Lay all the cards with the "I Am" side facing up on a central table so that people can see the range of different styles.

Read the Exodus passage dramatically, with three voices representing a narrator, God and Moses.

Following the passage explain that the name of God: 'I Am' can mean a number of things but one explanation is 'I am who you need me to be'. Let there be some silence allowing people to reflect on that.

Then invite people to take a card, and on the blank side write who they need God to be right now for them. Do not write any names or details that identify the person. Explain that others are going to be able to see what folk have written.

Ask everyone to place the card back on the table with the 'I Am' showing once more.

With some music playing in the background, invite everyone to tour the table, turning over an 'I Am' and offering a silent prayer of thanks or intercession for what is written on the other side. Replace it.

If appropriate, invite people to take a card away with them to hold in prayer throughout the week.



People On The Go

You will need: card shapes of people, felt tip pens, scissors, glue sticks, print out or photocopies of local area maps.

Give a person-shaped card to each person participating. Ask them to cut up the map sheets into small pieces and to stick these onto their people-shaped cards until one side of the card is covered and then draw features onto the face using felt tip pens

Talk about the stories and the connections between them regarding God sending people out to be messengers. Discuss where and how people feel they are being called to serve and to be messengers in their own local community.

Burning Bush

You will need: twigs of various lengths, plant pot, stones, red, yellow and orange paper, pencils, scissors, sticky tape.

This could be done individually, in small groups or in one group. Whichever way you choose will determine the size of the pots and twigs. Ask those participating to place stones into the pot filling to about two thirds level and then to put twigs into the stones making sure that twigs are quite firmly planted. Ask those participating to draw some leaf shapes onto the paper and to cut those out. They should now ask others in the group/ congregation to write their names on the leaves and then the leaves should be attached to the twigs using sticky tape

Discuss the story and the call of Moses. What do those who have written their names on the twigs feel God is calling them to do at this time?

Walk My Way

You will need: old shoes, frieze paper or lining paper, poster paint in a few different colours (this should be poured onto paper plates, one colour per plate), paintbrushes.

Roll out the frieze paper or lining paper onto a long table. Ask those participating to choose a shoe and to paint the sole of the shoe. They should then make a print of the sole of the shoe onto the paper (you should be able to get a couple of prints from one layer of paint). Each person should repeat this a few times or take turns in using the shoes. Use different colours and build up a picture of shoe prints. It works well either by having all the shoe prints in pairs as though people are 'walking' or filling the whole sheet with footprints going in different directions and overlapping.

Talk about the stories and the connections between them regarding God sending people out to be messengers of good news. Discuss how your church does that... if you have partnerships with charities at home or across the world, this might be a good opportunity to highlight that aspect of your church's mission.

Holy Ground

You will need: hula hoops or carpet tiles or chalk to mark out areas on floor.

Set out the hula hoops or carpet tiles randomly spaced around your meeting area or draw some circles about hula hoop size on floor. Ask participants to move about the area and when you call out "Holy ground" those participating stand in hoops, circles or on carpet tiles. They can help by making space for each other. Repeat a few times and each time reduce the number of holy ground options to stand on. The last area should be named 'I am who I am'.

Talk about the story and how Moses was surprised to meet God and to be standing on holy ground. Discuss times when we have been surprised by an awareness of God's presence.

Send Me

Gather those participating in the one central area and give them each a number. Then give instructions such as 'numbers 2, 3 & 7 take 4 small steps to the left' then 'numbers 4, 6 & 7 take 8 big steps forward'. Vary the combination of numbers, the direction in which people are travelling and the number of steps. After about 4 or 5 minutes, stop and see where all the people have ended up. You could also do this activity outside if you have a safe outdoor space, and the weather is nice.

Talk about the stories and the people being willing to go, to being sent, even though they did not know where the journey would take them.

Go Into All The World

You will need: copies of the activity wordsearch available on page 102, pencils.

Ask those participating to form small groups of 2 or 3 people mixing adults and children. Ask the groups to see how many different countries they can find within a certain time limit within the wordsearch. Note that the countries can be spelled out in any direction.

Talk about the followers being sent out 'into all the world' in Matthew 28. Discuss how people think they would have felt. Discuss Jesus' promise to be with them Do you think that changed the way they felt? Discuss times people have had similar feelings.





Call To Worship

In a world of identity politics where fame is significant and legacy more so, where names shape prejudice and offer opportunity, there is one name all recognise, yet is still unknown:
'I Am'.

And in this name, in this invitation, in this undefined definition we take off our shoes and worship.

Holy God, you identify yourself as the God of Abraham, Jacob and Isaac. You are the God of miracles and relationships, and we come to worship to praise you today, the one-in-three, incomprehensible,

Knowing the stories of our history, of those particular named individuals, we, too, are confident that you can love us, in our humanity.

That we can make errors and still serve your purposes.

We give you thanks for your great, forgiving love.

We come to you now, confessing our doubts, our inability to love our neighbour, our persistence in following our own way. We do not care for this exquisite world in which we have been placed, and we must look beyond our selfish ways to live reverently for your Creation. We cry out for respect for the planet and respect for your people. Return us to your right paths, teach us to obey your commands. Jesus models incomparably for us the way to live. Most of all to love: you, and your creation. Forgive us.

Gracious God, we bring these prayers in the name of Christ, Jesus, Amen.
